Hui Malama Delivers Remains to HPD

The following article appeared in the *Hawaii Tribune-Herald*, Sunday, December 31, 2000, page 3.

A nonprofit organization that receives funds from the federal government to reinter Hawaiian remains has turned hundreds of remains over to the state for disposal.

Michelle Bradley of the burials program at the state Historic Preservation Division said Hui Malama called the afternoon of Dec. 20 and delivered about 205 sets of remains the next morning.

The returned remains are believed to be part of more than a thousand sets

repatriated from Bishop Museum collections.

Hui Malama was paid by the federal Health and Human Services' Administration for Native Americans to rebury the entire collection.

Historic Preservation Division Director Don Hibbard said the state is accepting responsibility for the remains while it decides what to do next. He said the remains likely will be turned over to a community organization, such as the O'ahu Burial Council.

A spokesman for Hui Malama was not available for comment.

And much of the legislative deliberation took place without archaeologists at the table.

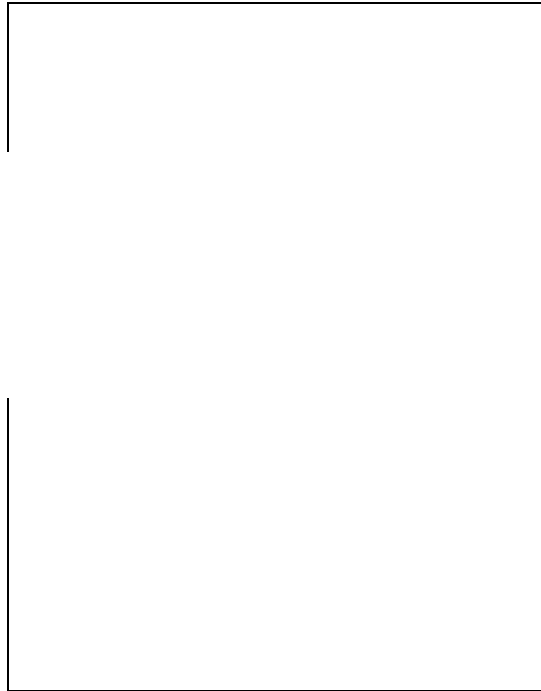
