Gardens of Lono: Archaeological investigations at the Amy B.H. Greenwell Ethnobotanical Garden, Kealahou, Hawai'i is edited by **Melinda S. Some of the Summer Headlines...

The controversial issues surrounding the **Hokuli'a** project in Kona continue their progress through the court system, following the completion of hearings in the Third Circuit Court in Kona. Three months of hearings have resulted in Judge Ronald Ibarra scheduling a full trial beginning November 13. A recent two-part historic preservation series by Jack and Gretchen Kelly in the *Hawai'i Island Journal* (see editions for August 1-15, and August 16-31) featured the hearings. The first edition focused on burial issues, and the second edition emphasized the detrimental legal repercussions resulting from the lack of promulgated rules for the State Historic Pres-

ervation Division.

In a somewhat related matter, the SHPD has continued to hold public hearings on its Draft State-wide Historic Preservation Plan. The plan is organized within four stated goals: 1) promoting effective land use planning that incorporates historic preservation concerns; 2) promoting community revitalization and economic revitalization through historic preservation; 3) increasing recognition of Hawai'i's historic resources; and 4) Increasing public knowledge of Hawai'i's historic properties and the benefits of historic preservation.

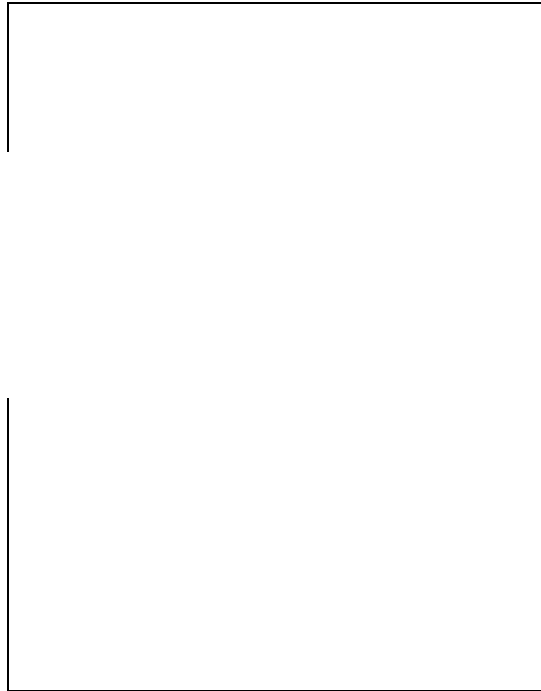
